Alonzo Mourning: I asked him three questions. I said, "Is there a cure for this?" He said no. I said, "Can I play basketball again?" He said, I don't know. And then I said, "Well, am I gonna die?"

And we'll hear from experts all over the world who will explain the little-known histories of these conditions: Like the connection between sickle cell disease and malaria... or how the ancient Egyptians detected type 1 diabetes using ants... or even the link between muscular dystrophy and autism.

But the most remarkable thing about these stories is how new investigational approaches are being applied to these 'cold cases.'

Like investigating stem cell treatments to potentially treat type 1 diabetes... or genetic therapies to tackle sickle cell disease.

Vertex, the company behind this work, doesn't care what approach they use, as long as it works.

Dr. Altshuler: We have decided to be agnostic to modality and use whatever tool is needed. So, we've turned it around and said, we're not in the business of having a hammer and looking for nails, we're in the business of looking for patients in need and gathering whatever tools are needed to make a difference for them.
